


3 D S E T T I N G M A P

SEPTEMBER BOOK SHARE



For this Book Share you will create a 3-dimensional map of the places described in the book you read. Carefully read and follow the requirements listed below.

DUE DATE: Thursday, September 29, 2016

STANDARDS & PURPOSES –

- Compare and contrast two or more settings in a story.
- Summarize a text.

INSTRUCTIONS & REQUIREMENTS –

1. For this Book Share, choose a book from your favorite genre. The book you choose to share must be a book you read on your own during the month of September. Please do not share a book read in class or for another class assignment (such as read aloud or Book Clubs).
2. After you finish reading the book, please write a book review in BookSource. (You will be taught how to write an effective book review in class.) Your book review will count for part of your score for this project.
3. Make a 3-dimensional map that shows multiple settings described in the book you read. Include any major places in your book on your map (for example: buildings, rooms, towns, parks, hideouts, etc.). Connect these places with roads, paths, hallways, footprints, etc. Much of the map can be drawn 2-dimensionally (flat) on the poster board. Remember that a map is drawn from a bird's eye view (looking down from above). Some of the places on your map should stand up (be 3-dimensional). You may use any raw materials (construction paper, clay, Popsicle sticks, paint, markers, twigs from a tree, rocks, etc.) to do this. Please do not glue things like pre-made toy houses or Legos to your poster. Make sure everything you put on the poster is securely fastened and won't fall off. Be creative and have fun!

Before you begin making your actual map on poster board, plan your map on scratch paper. You will be given one half-size poster board for this project.

4. Think of a creative way to include the title, author, and genre of your book somewhere on your poster (write in on a 3-D sign; design it into your map, etc.). Make sure they stand out and be easily noticed. (You will be taught how to recognize the genre of a book in class.)
5. On the day of the Book Share, bring your map and use it to compare and contrast the settings of your book. You should also use the setting map to help you summarize the events of the book.
