



HANG AROUND, THIS OUGHT TO BE GOOD!

For this Book Share you will create a hanging mobile that captures the book's main ideas and key supporting details and displays the expository text structure of the book you read. Carefully read and follow the requirements listed below.

## STANDARDS & PURPOSES -

- Compare and contrast the overall structure of expository texts.
- Demonstrate two or more main ideas of a text and explain how they are supported by key details.
- Summarize a text.

## **INSTRUCTIONS & REQUIREMENTS -**

- 1. For this Book Share, read a **nonfiction** book. The book you choose to share must be a book you read on your own during the month of September. Please do not share a book read in class or for another class assignment (such as read aloud or Book Clubs).
- 2. After you finish reading the book, please write a book review in BookSource. <u>Your book review will count for part of your score for this project.</u>
- 3. Create a hanging mobile that shows the book's main ideas and important supporting details and illustrates the expository text structure of the book you read. To make the mobile, attach strings, wires, or other connectors onto a hanger or another object. Then attach objects and/or papers with pictures or text onto each string or connector. Find a creative way to show the text structure of the book as you share the main ideas and key supporting details of the book. For example, if your book tells historical events in sequence, you could use the hanger as a timeline that has pictures and tells about the events in the order they happened. If your book follows a question and answer text structure, you could type a question on one side of a hanging card and the answer on the other side. You will be taught how to identify nonfiction text structure as well as main ideas and details in class. Be creative! Do your best to make your mobile look good and be informational to others.
- 4. Find a creative way to show the <u>title</u>, <u>author</u>, <u>and genre</u> of your book somewhere on your mobile. Try to make them stand out and be easily noticed. <u>If you read a book about America's history</u>, remember to also identify the era from American history in which your story takes place.
- 5. On the day of the Book Share, bring your mobile and use it to summarize the main ideas and key supporting details of the book and to tell about the text structure of book you read.
